Katie McIntyre (UNM History Ph.D. 2012) is an Associate Professor of Gender and Women's Studies and Associate Director of the Honors Program at the University of Rhode Island. She is the author of *Protestantism and State Formation in Postrevolutionary Oaxaca* (UNM Press, 2019). McIntyre was recently awarded an NEH fellowship for her new book project on Protestant women and activism in Mexico, 1920-1955.

Margarita R Ochoa is an Associate Professor of History at Loyola Marymount University. Her research examines questions of identity (gender, race, class, and Indigeneity), structures of power, and law and legal culture in colonial and early national Mexico. She is co-editor of *Cacicas: The Female Indigenous Leaders of Spanish America, 1492-1825* (OU Press, 2021) and *City Indians in Spain's American Empire* (Sussex, 2012).





Victoria González-Rivera is Associate Professor of Chicana/o Studies at San Diego State University. She is the author of *Before the Revolution*. *Women's Rights and Right-Wing Politics in Nicaragua, 1821-1979* (2011) and is completing an English-language book titled "500 years of Western Nicaraguan LGBTQIA+ history."

Shawn Austin is Associate Professor at the University of Arkansas. His book, *Colonial Kinship: Guarani, Spaniards, and Africans in Paraguay* (UN M Press, 2020), argues that Guaranf kinship norms shaped colonial institutions. This research emphasizes the lives of Guaranf women and the impossible decisions they faced in the first two centuries of colonization.





Chad Black is Associate Professor of History and the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. He's the author of *The Limits of Gender Domination* (2011) and other works on the history of gender and sexuality late colonial Spanish America.
