Description of Research, Teaching and Service Interests

My research has been focused on Amazonian indigenous peoples and centers around 1) the dynamics of ritual practice; 2) history; and 3) the social anthropology of the person and personal experience including indigenous autobiographical genres, particularly how these genres reflect and are used to address large scale social shifts. I have carried out field research among the Kawaiwete (Kayabi) as well as done extensive archival work in Brazil. My ethnography, *"I Foresee My Life"* (2005) explores how different types of leaders construct a sense of agency for their followers in events such as, political oratory, shamanic cures, and mortuary rituals. I understand particular performances to build up structures of identification between living persons, ancestors, and non-Kawaiwete to give participants a sense of power as they face a variety of contemporary situations. Presently, my interests are centered on the role autobiographical accounts can play in writing lowland indigenous histories. In 2014, I published a co-edited volume, *Fluent Selves*, which explores autobiographical narrative practices across the South American lowlands. My book, *Amazonian Cosmopolitans* (2022) features the autobiographical accounts of two Kawaiwete leaders whose lives spanned the twentieth century and who played roles in high profile, national projects during a moment when central Brazil became a focus for Brazil. It offers two indigenous perspectives on how these projects and shifting indigenous policies were experienced and shaped by indigenous actors.

I am taking my research in new directions in the coming years. I am designing a research project centered on celiac disease and the methods of coping with chronic conditions. I plan on focusing on the role which personal narratives, one's own and those of others, can play the management of this condition.

My teaching interests have centered on 1) the study of ritual and semiotics; 2) religion; 3) the history of anthropological theory; 4) life history; 5) Latin America. I have taught undergraduate and graduate classes on the topic of ritual. We read classic approaches to this topic as well as contemporary ethnographies focusing on the role of ritual practices in contexts such as migration, colonialism, recognition, postcolonial revaluations of race, and the revival of heritage. I have developed an undergraduate/graduate course on the topic of shamanism and a graduate seminar on the anthropology of Christianity. With respect to courses in anthropological theory, I have taught a 100 level introduction to cultural anthropology, a 300 level overview of the history of theory, and a 500 level graduate seminar focusing on post WWII theory. I have also taught a graduate seminar focusing on the use of autobiography and life history in socio-cultural anthropology. I have developed 300 level courses on the history and present situation of indigenous South American peoples, on race and ethnicity in Brazil, and on shamanic traditions within a variety of colonial and national contexts in Latin America.

I have done service at all levels. I have been the Graduate Advisor for the Ethnology subfield in my department for eight years and have been the Graduate Director for the department as a whole for four years. From 2013-21, and 2023-4 I have served as the Convener for Ethnology. I have been active at the Latin American and Iberian Institute and in Religious Studies as well as in the mid-pro review committee in the College of Arts and Sciences. Within the field of anthropology I am part of editorial boards and review grants and manuscripts for journals and presses.
