Short Narrative Description of Research, Teaching and Service Interests

My research has been focused in two locations—the Mexican diaspora on the U.S. east coast and the Yucatan peninsula in Mexico. It centers on 1) processes of social, including racial and ethnic, identification; 2) language as social practice; and 3) the anthropology of education. I am interested in the relationships between language practice, social differentiation, and ontogenetic and cognitive development, how these inform understandings of persons, and how narrational and institutional practices influence these. Between 2010-2016, I conducted collaborative research in the Mexican diaspora on the east coast of the U.S. This research resulted in 13 scholarly presentations, 4 refereed articles, 2 book chapters, and a co-authored book, titled *Migration Narratives: Diverging Stories in Schools, Churches*, and Civic Institutions (Bloomsburg Academic 2020). Since 2013, my research has explored how Yucatec Maya speakers are engaging in higher education on the Yucatan peninsula, using Maya as the language of instruction. I study an undergraduate program in "Maya Linguistics and Culture" where I have observed how doing linguistics in Maya is changing what is known about the Maya language, about the scientific discipline of linguistics, and about what it means to be Maya today. I study how Maya-ness is recognized on the Yucatan peninsula and what implications this has for who can engage in activities, like the practice of linguistics. It is a project in moving beyond modern and post-modern theoretical constructs that (de)limit the processes and objects of our analyses, yet it simultaneously recognizes and engages the importance of these constructs to institutionalized and everyday accounts of personhood. Based on this work, I have given 17 presentations and published a solo-authored article, a co-authored article, and a coauthored book chapter. I am currently writing a book on this research, titled Exceptional Maya-ness: Linguistics as a Site for 'Maya' Beyond Modernity in Yucatan Today. My new research, U tukulil maaya: Maya ways of knowing and the socio-cultural foundations of cognition, (RAC-funded, 2020) builds from my existing research. It addresses questions generated by conducting higher education in Maya, specifically if higher education can be 'Mayanized' or if it exerts 'Western-academic' effects on 'Maya' thought. This research will contribute to understandings of a 'Maya' way of knowing.

My teaching foci proceed from my research interests: 1) semiotic and linguistic anthropological theories, 2) scale theory, 3) anthropology of education, 4) Indigeneity, and 5) Mexico and Latin America more generally. I have taught undergraduate and graduate courses on these topics and a graduate proposal writing course. I have taught at the 1000, 300, and 500 levels in the department and mentored B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. students through independent study courses and thesis or dissertation credit hours. My courses include the core linguistic anthropological courses in the undergraduate and graduate programs in Ethnology, as well as undergraduate and graduate topics courses and seminars. In fall of 2021, I will teach a new course on Indigeneity and modernity. I have also taught the undergraduate introductory and upperdivision core theory courses in cultural anthropology. In each of my courses, I work to expand my range of interlocutors by engaging canonical and less-well-known sources. My teaching proceeds from a sociocultural theory of learning, which views cognition as produced in and through social processes, and, thus seeks to foster transformation through activity. To foster student learning, I explicitly define learning in my courses and develop congruent pedagogical and assessment approaches. I make these choices explicit to students and incorporate their input, informing course design through students' needs, levels of preparedness, and expectations. I teach analytical and critical thinking and writing skills simultaneously with course content. I view students' application of course concepts to understand the world as evidence of learning. Thus, students find my courses both extremely challenging and extremely rewarding.

My **service** proceeds from my commitment to expanding access to who can participate in academic enterprises. I bring my Ph.D. in Education to bear on assessing learning at the program level (BA Ethnology), for which I received a grant to revamp undergraduate assessment. I am a member of the Undergraduate Committee and the Undergraduate Faculty Advisor for Ethnology (both since 2019).

In sum, I believe that how we come to know has enormous implications for what we come to know. Thus, I am committed to engaging new ways of knowing and new knowers and to questioning my own frameworks in the process. This requires attending to processes and positional differences and simultaneously inhabiting the roles of expert and learner.
