## HIBBEN UNDERGRADUATE FELLOWSHIP FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM: KOHALA, HAWAI'I ISLAND, SUMMER, 2022

We encourage undergraduate students (or those who've graduated but not yet started graduate school) to apply for an Undergraduate Hibben Fellowship, sponsored by the Department of Anthropology at the University of New Mexico. This fellowship covers University of New Mexico tuition and fees (6-credit hours, Anth 375), \$1000 course fees (for housing, meals, supplies, local travel), up to \$800 travel to Hawaii, and provides a \$3000 stipend for successful completion of the program. Dr. Michael Graves will offer an 8-week program of study: the first a 4-week summer program of archaeological fieldwork in Hawai'i; the second 4-weeks, students will work remotely to complete their independent research projects.



Students will learn basic geospatial database management and conduct analyses on remote sensing, archaeological, and historic, data pertaining to the development of traditional Hawaiian agriculture in the Moku (district) of Kohala on the Island of Hawai'i. Students selected for this program will spend four weeks in the field collecting archaeological data on dryland and irrigated agricultural practices from the 14<sup>th</sup> to mid-19<sup>th</sup> centuries. Evening sessions will be

regularly devoted to discussions about the larger research project, Hawaiian archaeology, and ethical issues archaeologists face in conducting their studies. Students will also be introduced to Native Hawaiian culture and history, and participate in our program of collaborative research and outreach with local communities in Kohala.



The second four weeks, students will return home and work remotely to complete a research project, under the guidance of Dr. Graves using data they collected in the field as well as previously collected, archived data from the Hawai'i Historical and Archaeological Research Project. This program of study will extend from early June through the end of July 2022. Students will have an opportunity to present their research at professional and educational conferences.
